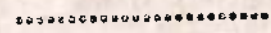

3. No animal may take more than one Medal under Scheme D in 1918.

No award of the Society's Prizes or Medals to a Hunter named and registered in the Hunter Stud Book, and subsequently entered by the owner under another name, will be recognised or confirmed unless a re-entry has been previously lodged by the owner for the Hunter Stud Book and the new name registered by the Society.
